Visitors will be asked to identify themselves and state the purpose of their visit before they will be permitted to enter the building. Upon entry, visitors must sign the Visitor/Volunteer book and receive an orange visitor badge to wear during their stay.


## **DAILY SCHEDULE**

#### **FRENCH CLUB**

French Club students gathered on Thursday, April 6 to celebrate the French holiday, Poisson d'avril. Poisson d'avril occurs every year on April 1 and is the French version of April Fool's Day. # **END OF YEAR NOTES FROM THE NURSE**

As another school year is coming to a close I wanted to take this opportunity to thank everyone for a great year. Here are a few reminders for the rest of the year and planning for next year:

- 1. Letters will be going out over the summer to those families that had students with emergency action plans in place the previous year.
  - If your student continues to need an emergency action plan, please fill out the forms that are sent and return to the school office prior to the start of the school year. We do need a new, updated, plan each school year.
  - If your student's health concern has been resolved or you wish to decline an emergency action plan for any reason, please select that option on the letter and return to school.
  - If you have a student that did not have a plan in place this year, or expected one in the mail and did not receive it, and need one for next year please visit our health services website at <a href="https://www.wdpsd.com/district/health-services.cfm">https://www.wdpsd.com/district/health-services.cfm</a> for our district action plan forms. If you do not find what you are looking for please reach out to me or the office staff as needed.
- Immunizations: Wisconsin law requires all students to show that they have received the required immunizations or have a signed waiver on file.
  - If your student has any immunizations updated over the summer or throughout the school year please make sure a copy is provided.
  - All students entering 7th grade are required to receive a dose of Tdap or sign a waiver. - Vision Screenings: Vision screenings are done in the fall each year for grades 4k-2. Additional information including opt-out forms are shared closer to the screening date. We do have the ability to screen any student that may need it. If you feel your student needs a vision screen and is not in the selected grades, please reach out as needed and we can accommodate this request.

- Medications at school: Medication forms can be found on our district website. All medications (prescription and OTC) given at school need to have a consent on file and updated every year. Whenever possible, a student's medication should be scheduled outside of the school day. However, when medication is needed at school the following is required:
  - It is important to have our district's medication consent form completed and signed. Having our forms signed versus a doctor's letter/note helps us keep things uniform and prevent errors from occurring. There are some circumstances where we would need a doctor's letter but for most, having our forms filled out gives us the information we need. We appreciate your help with this.
  - All prescription medications taken at school need to have a medication form filled out and signed by the parent/guardian and the doctor.
  - All OTC medications taken at school must have a medication consent completed and signed by a parent/guardian. If the medication is taken in any way different from the package directions then a doctor must sign as well.
  - All medications must be kept in the main school office/nurses office unless noted on medication consent. If a student is to carry or administer any prescription or OTC medication themselves we must still have a consent on file and a doctor's signature stating ok to self administer.
  - We do not keep medications over summer while students are not in school. Please pick up any unused medication at the end of the school year/summer school. Any medications that are not picked up will be disposed of.
  - When to keep students home from school:
    - If your student has vomiting, fever, or diarrhea they will be asked to stay home until symptoms have resolved for 24 hours
    - If your student has any symptoms that would be disruptive to learning please keep home.
    - If your student has any unexplained rash that is open or oozing that cannot be covered by clothing
    - Keep home if they have a contagious illness such as chicken pox, pink eye (conjunctivitis), impetigo, scabies, live head lice, or any other illness as determined by your healthcare provider.
